
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AMBULATORY CARE VISITS by Health Centers, March 2016-2018




TOTAL AMBULATORY PATIENTS VISITS March 2016- 2018


No. of RX filled by health facility March 2018



Third Party Revenue by Health Centers February 2016- Fenruary 2018(Based on Year to-date Collections)






Ambulatory Care services report for Health centers-

- AMO Health Center (AHC): 25 new charts. Radiology Department received ACR and FDA reaccreditation.
- Cooweescoowee Health Center (CHC): 97 new/reactivated charts. PHN's attended Skiatook Senior Meeting and Copan Senior Meeting. Kayla Horton, LPN, joined the Public Health staff. Brandi Payton, Clinic Administrator, was selected as a participant for the American Indian Chamber of Commerce of Oklahoma's 2018 "Leadership Native Oklahoma" class. Brandi Payton, Robin Colclasure, QM Nurse, Lindsay Gatrell, Chief Pharmacist, Melissa Whitchurch, Nurse Manager, and Jeff Abrams, Caretaker Supervisor, attended 2018 Tribal Nations Training Week at the Center for Domestic Preparedness in Anniston, Alabama.
- Sam Hider Health Center (SHHC): 36 new/reactivated charts. Staff attended the District 9 & 10 Community Meeting and provided information regarding Medicaid, ACA, Hepatitis B, and offered flu shots. SHHC hosted two blood drives. They had 12 patients in the Patient Advocacy Council. Staff donated 55 Easter Baskets to the Delaware County Action Early Head Start.
- Three Rivers Health Center (TRHC): 94 new patients. Dietitians provided healthy snack sampling, trivia and demonstrations for National Nutrition Month.
- Vinita Health Center (VHC): 95 new charts. 20 new users at the Wellness Center. Human Services provided
 Tax preparation services. Denielle Shaffer, Patient Services Coordinator, Carey Wilson, Office
 Manager/Safety Officer, Shaun Sanders, Chief Pharmacists and Elton Sunday, Clinic Administrator
 participated in training at the Center for Domestic Preparedness in Anniston, Alabama. Dr. Amanda Bighorse
 is the new Medical Director.
- Wilma P. Mankiller Health Center (WPMHC): 27 new/reactivated charts. Cherokee Livers retired after 34 years of service. The Blood Drive had 35 donations. PHN staff provided Hep B vaccinations to Siloam Springs Casino staff. WPMHC recognized in OKC for receiving the Oklahoma Certified Healthy business Excellence Certification. Ben Gustin, Pharmacist, received an award for most valuable participant at Tribal Nations Training Week in Anniston, Alabama.

• Announcements

Dr. Julie Mahaney has signed and returned a letter of commitment to join our medical staff as a full-time physician in Urgent Care.

• Achievements

- Vickie Caldwell recognized our nurses with national certifications this week as part of National Certified Nurses Day on March 19th. National certification is desired for our nursing staff due to the validation of a high level of professional achievement and its demonstration of proficiency and a broad base of knowledge beyond licensure.
- One year ago, the first piece of heavy equipment started work on the site that now hosts the completed super structure (made up of 3,200 tons of structural steel) of our new outpatient health center. On March 26th, we hosted a Topping Off ceremony during which all of our stakeholders had the opportunity to sign the final beam of the new building before it was hoisted up and put in place.

Patient Access

- Labor and Delivery delivered 67 babies during March 2018. The Emergency Department and Urgent Care provided care to 5,759 patients during March 2018 with a Left Without Being Seen (LWOBS) rate of 4.6%. Surgical Services performed 483 surgical procedures during March 2018.
- Dental Services: Clinical visits include Exams, Emergency Exams, Return Visits for Treatment, Diabetic Screenings, and Headstart Screenings: 7,078 clients served. Scheduled Dental Examinations for routine care: 2,446 clients were served. Emergency Exams- These are unscheduled walk in patients 999 clients served.
- Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program- The program served 155 Indian/Cherokee women (Clinical Breast Exam, Mammograms, Ultrasound, Pap smear, HPV testing, Colposcopy with or without biopsy, Colposcopy w/ ECC and ECC, and Cytopathology) at the cost of \$14,038. Education/outreach Cooweescoowee Health Center, Jay HC, Jay Community center.
- Behavioral Health Service- A range of behavioral health Services were provided to <u>1,838 clients</u> across 2,414 visits to Behavioral Health in March, 2018. The services provided ranged from initial treatment intakes to psychiatric services to rigorous psychological assessments to parent-child interaction therapy and include animal-assisted, individual, group, and marriage and family therapy.
- Dietary Services 740 clients were provided dietary counseling services. Services include DSME Classes; DM Classes; Weight Mgmt. Classes; Employee Activity Committee Activities; DM Ancillary Clinic; Lunch and Learn; Healthy Native Program-Nutrition Lessons; Employee Wellness Wt. Challenge; Maintain Don't Gain Challenge. Classes/Presentations: 20 (# of participants). Worksite or Community Classes/Presentations: 465 (# of participants)
- Emergency Medical Services—the program served 490 clients; of those 352 were routine transport and 12 were emergency transports. In addition 627 participants were trained at our facility
- Public Health Nursing @ Claremore- PHN's provided 87 Home Visits/postpartum checkup, 236 clinic screenings/classes, and 1,054 phone call/audits/letters. Public Health Nursing @ Hastings- PHN's provided 99 Home Visits, 410 clinic screenings/classes, and 428 phone call/audits/letters.
- Staffing Report—Total positions: 2,452; of these 2,203 (89.8%) are filled, 249 (11%) are vacant.
- Contract Health Services—During the month of March 2018, CHS program processed 10,419 referrals of those 10,250 (98.3%) were approved at the cost of \$4,779,335
- Health facilities Completed 81% of 184 preventive maintenance. Completed 123 of 138 called in work orders.
 Completed 100% OF property work orders. Requisitioned Architectural drawings for WPMHC remodel
 Conducted a physical environment surveys at Sam Hider, AMO, WPMHC Health Centers. Conducted physical
 environment surveys at both Behavioral Health locations. Developed the Infection Control Risk Assessments
 ICRA) at WPMHC, AMO, TRHC, and RBSHC health centers.
- Diabetes Services—The 548 diabetic patients were provided DSME or other diabetes-related classes by a RN/Pharmacist. 1427 patients received nutrition education from a RD. \$25,212.14 has been spent to purchase DM shoes, Year to date 2018.

Public Health Educators—The Public health educators works directly with Cherokee communities. They are engaged in promoting, hosting and supporting, physical activities, Smoking cessation classes, Healthy Native living Classes. The PHE continues to facilitate Healthy Native Diabetes Prevention classes held at the Healthy Living Campus, Running/Walking clubs, programs like, "RETHINK YOUR DRINK", Farmers Market, Cultural Presentation to the Boys and Girls Club of Mayes County, they walked with 40 + after school students at the Salina Elementary track. PHEs in Adair County have been encouraging a Healthy Lifestyle to staff at the Wilma P Mankiller Clinic, the clinic staff has lost a combined 176.9 pounds and many, many more inches.
