

Executive & Finance Committee Career Services July Monthly Report Diane Kelley, Executive Director

Career Services has submitted a revised Letter of Intent to the Department of Health and Human Services Dallas Regional Office for the Tribal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families Program (**Tribal TANF**). Unfortunately, the state of Oklahoma is unable to provide the information we need based on tribal area. We are working with David Justice of our GIS department and the Muscogee (Creek) Nation TANF program to come up with a solution that is fair to both tribes and acceptable to the state.

Brenda Fitzgerald, Director Vocational Rehabilitation, Kim Carroll, Director Grants & Compliance, Debra Lack, Director Finance, and Jon Crittenden, Day Training Coordinator attended the National **Tribal TANF** Institute presented by the University of California UC Davis Extension.

The **Day Training Program** had six participants enter unsubsidized employment. One was with Cherokee Nation, two were with CNB/CNI, and three were externally. Four participants attained the Food Handler Certification.

The **Disability Employment Initiative** staff Josh Drywater and Cheryl Adams attended the week long CANAR Conference. DEI and **Vocational Rehabilitation** staff met with the state Vocational Rehabilitation Evaluation team on how to collaborate.

Career Services staff Kim Carroll, Director Grants & Compliance, Jon Crittenden, Day Training Coordinator, and Hunter Palmer, Special Projects Officer joined Council Speaker Joe Byrd and

Career Services in partnership with Behavioral Health, is currently writing for a new funding grant through the Department of Labor. It is the National Health Emergency Dislocated Worker Demonstration Grant to Address the Opioid Crisis. We have applied for approximately \$5 million for a two year period.


Summer Youth Participant Success:

PL 102-477 Participant Success:

This story starts back in 2016 with participation on SYEP for 2016-2017. Avery Taylor, 17 years old, was home schooled and wanted to work for SYEP. He was placed with the K-P Heat



and Air for two SYEP terms; he worked part time for K-P during the 2016 school term. He had time to do a little work, especially on Saturday. He came in for Heat & Air vocational training at ITCT in 2017-2018. His teachers kept telling me that Avery was doing well, in fact, above all of the students.

Avery continued working part time as a process piping tech in Fort Smith making \$12.50 per hour while attending school fulltime. When Avery was only half way through his training, ITCT let him test for his certification. He had completed 525 hours out of 1050 and passed his entire test. He got his certificate of competency on May1, 2018.

On June 20, 2018 Avery's mother brought his

certificate in, saying he is making \$17.25 per hour at this time. This just goes to show you that if you can do it you can apply yourself. Avery and the family are very happy with this success story.

Congratulations to all our participant successes!

Daryl Legg, Director Reentry and the Tribal Economic Development Program (TED) went to William S Keys Correctional Center to speak to a group inmates at their GED graduation and also attended a Reentry meeting at the Creek Nation. Sallisaw had a groundbreaking ceremony for Aviagen. It is a breeding company that is expanding and hiring 45 new employees. Staff also attended the Integration Summit in Pryor.





Commercial Lending Impact 2010 through 2018 by County





Entrepreneurial capacity building, through one-on-one assistance and in workshops settings, is available throughout the year to help entrepreneurs with business planning, strategic growth, marketing assistance, social media marketing, cash flow management, procurement and affordable financing.

In 2018, Business training workshops and the annual Engage Expo attracted 3,159 people representing Indian owned businesses, 119 of which were TERO certified businesses. Additionally, 112 entrepreneurs received one-on-one business coaching.





The Cherokee Arts Center provides teaching space and specialized equipment for artists to increase their revenues. Year to date, 1,493 people have attended 269 artist taught classes and the equipment has been used 1,578 times by 1,113 artists. One artist space is used exclusively by the National Treasures to both work and to teach class. Year to date artists have taken advantage of the Cherokee Arts Center 3,094 times.
