#### **Key Project Summary**

#### Capital Projects

- Cherokee National Capitol Update:
  - o Capitol Museum Development Phase 1- Interior Renovation
    - Work will be complete in early 2019.
  - o Capitol Museum Development Phase 2- Exhibit fabrication
    - Work is underway and will be complete in spring 2019.
  - o Cherokee National Capitol Museum will open spring 2019.
- Downtown Tahlequah Cultural Pathway
  - Currently working on the design of a cultural pathway to connect Cherokee
     Nation's downtown cultural resources.
    - Design will be bid late Fall 2018
- Saline Courthouse Restoration:
  - The restoration of the courthouse and the construction of an onsite caretaker's home were approved by the CNB board of Directors in July.
    - Restoration work began in August and will be complete in spring 2019. Work includes interior and exterior renovation to the courthouse, modernizing mechanical, electrical and plumbing, renovation of all interiors (walls, ceilings, floors, windows, and doors) to bring the building to a useable space.
    - The caretaker's home should begin construction in late fall and will be complete spring 2019.

- 3. Lula Elk continues teaching a class at Murrow Indian home in Muskogee and a Cherokee language & culture class in South Coffeyville. She continues teaching a language class for Cherokee Heritage Center employees.
- 4. Online Cherokee language classes in session through November.
- 5. Lawrence Panther attended an at-large community meeting in Albuquerque Oct. 6 and did a presentation about the Cherokee syllabary.
- 6. Staff assisted with the JOM Cherokee challenge bowl October 22-25.
- 7. Dennis Sixkiller taught Cherokee Language at the Cherokee Heritage Center October 4 & 5th during their cultural days event for over 1,000 children.

1. Develop Cherokee Language class for RSU for college credit

- 4. Developed Cherokee language curriculum materials for schools including classroom posters, audio recordings, and illustrations
- 5. Created language content for use for Cherokee Nation social media posts, including photos, videos, and basic language lessons
- 6. Provided assistance to the Cherokee Language Consortium meeting in October
- 7. Finalized design for the new Cherokee language coloring activity book focused on snakes.
- 8. Started creating new questions for the Online Language class to add to the online quiz bank for the online class examinations.
- 9. Assisting Dennis Sixkiller with editing of audio files for the Cherokee New Testament recording project.
- 10. Assisted Dennis Sixkiller at the Cherokee Heritage Center cultural days event
- 11. Zach Barnes is assisting Roy Boney, Tonya Bryant, and Tonya Russell on creating an online course called Cherokee 101. The course is a designed for public school teacher enrichment for those wishing to teach Cherokee history, culture, and basic language as part of their Native American studies programs.
- 12. Provided technical support for the Cherokee Language Teacher Training Program scholarship students with setting up their laptops for the 2018-19 academic school year

#### Accomplishments:

- 1. Sent 9 staff members to attend the Cherokee Language Consortium in Cherokee, NC October 2-5<sup>th</sup> (See words list at the end of this report)
- 2. Assisted with monthly Speakers Bureau meetings.
- 3. Staff continues translation of technology terms for Microsoft and Google.
- 4. October 18th held the first ever Cherokee Speaking Employee Appreciation day in conjunction with the Cherokee Master Apprentice Program. 117 Cherokee speaking employees attended the event.
- 5. Cherokee language speaker survey update as of October 25: 1,930 names of living first language Cherokee speakers recorded so far
- 6. Roy Boney provided a design for a keepsake medallion to be given to our Cherokee speakers to honor them.
- 7. Translation Program and Cherokee Language Master Apprentice Program continue recording Cherokee speakers reading the New Testament. Dennis Sixkiller is overseeing the recording process and is acting as producer for the program.
- 8. Roy Boney attended the Indigenous Connectivity Summit in Inuvik, Northwest Territories, Canada. Was invited as a guest speaker to talk about the use of technology and Cherokee language in Cherokee Nation. Travel was provided by the non-profit organization the Internet Society.

#### Future Plans/New Initiatives:

1. Currently identifying Cherokee speakers to revise the Cherokee Language State Certification test with the Oklahoma State Department of Education in 2019.
