Accomplishments:

- 1) The update on the Health and Safety Grant includes completion of the floor at the Salina Early Learning Academy. The buckling wood floor was replaced with tile and the children and staff are enjoying a level, clean classroom. The classroom cameras material has been received and installation is scheduled in the near future.
- 2) The 25th annual Early Childhood Conference was a huge success based on the participants evaluations. The topics and presenters were well received. The visitors from Muscogee and Kickapoo Head Start expressed their pleasure and how much they learned from networking with the Cherokee Nation faculty and our public school partners.
- 3) The safe room at the Redbird Early Head Start site has been completed and the Cherry Tree safe room is near completion. The Wauhillau site at Nowata is scheduled after Cherry Tree. So proud of these facilities since the tornado season no longer has a season. Reassuring our children will be safer now.
- 4) Thank you to the Environmental Health inspectors that go out and survey our facilities for updates, repairs or suggested replacements. The Kenwood site had no violations this month and six of the 11 classrooms in the Children's Village had no violations as well. The five with violations were related to the water temperature.
- 5) The state licensing representative visited the Salina Early Learning Academy and found no violations. Kudos to the faculty at SELA for keeping the facility clean, organized, current credentials, updated on repairs and paperwork in order. There are six classrooms at the SELA site.
- 6) Four administrative staff attended the Office of Head Start training in Albuquerque, NM in November. The sessions they attended included in-depth training on special needs services, education and the Coaching initiative. It was a great conference (with no registration fee) and a great opportunity to network. The OHS hosts the training at select sites throughout the country and the Cherokee Nation Head Start will host one of their conferences in May, 2019 with a focus on Education.
- 7) One faculty member received their CDA.

Upcoming initiatives:

1) The conference response team will convene on December 14, 2018 to offer recommendations for the 2019 conference. This team is comprised of a diverse group representing the ECU and play an instrumental role in setting the format, content and focus for the upcoming conference. This also gives them ownership in the direction of the agenda and in customizing the training on a need based format. The various committees will meet soon as well to work on the preliminary planning of the 2019 conference.

- 2) Five faculty from the Early Childhood Unit received scholarships from Tulsa Technical College to begin work on their Early Childhood degrees. TTC introduced the opportunity during their presentation at the November conference and five took advantage and were successful. Proud of the staff from SELA and the Children's Village.
- 3) Three staff will attend the NHSA winter leadership institute in January in Washington, DC. It will be interesting to learn the new funding levels and new initiatives for Head Start.


