# Education Committee Career Services August Monthly Report Diane Kelley, Executive Director

Alternative Education had eight student pass all components of the HSE (GED®, HiSET®) Test during the month of August. Our total graduate count is 61 (53 of which are Cherokee Nation citizens. Eight are members of a different federally recognized tribe.)

Brad Perry, Alternative Education Supervisor, and Jana Kingfisher, Testing Assistant, attended the 2019 GED Testing Service Annual Conference in Chicago, IL from July 23-27<sup>th</sup>.

**Alternative Education** has developed a new HSE Class schedule for the 2019-20 year that will be in effect starting September 3, 2019:

Disability Employment Initiative (DEI) Program Manager, Marsha White and Chrystal Lofton,



Disability Resource Navigator, completed and passed the Certified Work Incentive Practitioner course. They also completed the required training with American Dream Employment Network and will begin taking Ticket to Work clients in September, 2019.

**DEI** Disability Resource Navigator Chrystal Lofton attended the Oklahoma Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation Conference held in

Durant, Oklahoma. She received training on working with individuals with disabilities.

The **DEI** Lunch and Learn was presented to 45 Career Services Staff; the topic of the email and Lunch and Learn presentation was Ticket to Work.



The Department of Labor visited the Cherokee Nation complex to meet with the members of the **Trade and Economic Transition** (TET) Program. The technical assistance visit allowed a partnership with the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission to begin, as the Department of Labor wanted to use the Trade and Economic Transition team of Cherokee Nation as the shining example of how to operate a federal grant program. The team was allowed opportunities to talk about their operating procedures and best practices and show the federal project officers successful work experiences in action.



TET welcomed the newest and final addition to the team this month to complete the employment needs of the grant. Pryor Job Developer, Courtney Donkor, joins the team with an extensive background in academics and teaching. Courtney is originally from Locust Grove and she has worked with Native tribes in the southwestern region of the United States. She is glad to be back home and raising her family within the jurisdiction of her tribe.

### **Vocational Programs Participant Success:**



Forrest Garner is currently a Power Plant Technology student at OSIVIT, Okmulgee. The student started his training in September 2017 and will complete in August 2019 with an Associate's of Applied Science in Power Plant Technology. With this degree he can start a career in the electrical power generation industry.

When Forrest chose this career, he wanted to have a job that would financially allow him to continue living in Northeast Oklahoma, but support family and personal expenses. As this area of Oklahoma has many large manufacturing industries plus water and electrical companies, Forrest believed this would be a good opportunity and career for him.

In the Power Plant Technology program, he learned how to utilize the latest technology and equipment with hands on training. He also participated in internships, a requirement for this program, so students can gain experience before they graduate. The students were

allowed to explore different aspects of a power plant from water chemistry to electrical distribution.

While participating in the internship at Grand River Dam Authority in Langley, and after becoming a second year student, Forrest was asked if he would like to continue working with the GRDA and receive a permanent position at completion of training. This was an exciting opportunity; the location was in the area he wanted and this allowed the student to receive pay of \$15.96 per hour while on his internship rotation. Forrest was also informed that at completion of training and with permanent employment, his salary would immediately increase to \$31.00 per hour. He gladly accepted this offer and will be eligible for a permanent position in August 2019.

The student is happy with his choice of the Power Plant Technology program and states he would like to encourage other individuals to consider this two year training. With ten power plants in Eastern Oklahoma, this particular training will always have a need for new ideas and employees to fill the jobs.

The Career Skills Education Class had 121 individuals complete training.

#### **Accomplishments:**

- Two management staff attended a "train the trainer" session in Portland, OR for CLASS (Classroom Assessment Scoring System) certification. Their credential qualifies them to provide the necessary training for the CLASS audits and will save the program a significant amount of training funds. They will also conduct training for our public school teachers.
- The ECU submitted two grant applications. One is the annual continuation for Early Head Start and Head Start services. The second application includes one-time health and safety projects. If funded, the driveway and parking at the Salina site will be improved, as well as playground equipment and fencing and additional classroom cameras.
- 3) Replacement items have been ordered for the Webber Falls classroom and playground. A complete classroom kit and impact material and border will be replaced around the playground piece.
- 4) The Head Start children began school August 12, 2019 after the faculty completed two weeks of renewing health related certifications and setting up their classrooms.

#### **Upcoming initiatives:**

- The quarterly public school Superintendents meeting is scheduled August 22, 2019 at 11:30 in the ECU conference room. This meeting kicks off the school year planning and review of goals and expectations of teachers and supervisors as well as plotting the training schedule for CLASS reliability certification.
- 2) A strategic planning session for management staff is scheduled for August 28-29 in the areas of training, recruitment/retention/reward, documentation and events.
- Representatives from the FACES research project (Family and Child Experiences Survey) will make a site visit in Sept or Oct. The research project involves interviewing parents to collect data on services provided. Research will provide descriptive, nationally representative information on the characteristics, experiences and development of Head Start children and families, and the characteristics of the Head Start programs and staff who serve them.
