The month of September saw the closing of the summer exhibit "The Earth Shakers: the Influence of Cherokee Women" and the Homecoming Art Show and Sale. The fall/winter exhibit "American Indians in Professional Baseball: 1897-1947 opened. Diligwa village has had visitors from 35 states and 22 foreign countries. The long range planning for the exhibit next summer will be one on Traditional and Native Foods in Partnership with the Cherokee Nation Healthy Living initiative and CDC; the USDA Farm to School Project with Pam Kingfisher; the Heirloom Seed Program by Mr. Pat Gwin; and, Ms. Tamara Walkingstick, a retired Cherokee with whom I served on the Forest Resource Coordinating Committee of the US Forest Service, she teaches Wild and Native Recipes of Cherokee origin.

Outreach begins to get busy in September. Schools are back in the swing of things after being gone all summer and they're ready for cultural activities. This month Outreach visited 3 schools, a major cultural event in Oklahoma City at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, and attended the Oklahoma Museum Association Conference in Durant, OK.

The Cherokee Celebration Day at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum went very well. This is the second year that CHC and NCWHM have partnered to present this event to the public and it was hugely successful this year. With the help of the Cherokee Nation JOM Office, as well as Cherokee Nation Education personnel, we were able to provide cultural demonstrations and activities to 804 students from schools in and around Oklahoma City. We hope that this is a program that can be sustained throughout the coming years, as it is very beneficial to reach students in this area that might not otherwise have a chance to learn about Cherokee history and culture.

Also, this month the Outreach program received confirmation that we will receive the Oklahoma Humanities Council Major grant, as well as the matching funds to receive the full grant amount, allowing the Outreach program to provide cultural services to area schools for another year.
