



II. Program Highlights

a.) Motor Vehicle

II. Program Highlights

a. Self-Governance Professionals Workshop and Strategy Session

The Self-Governance Director and representatives of the Health Staff attended the Self-Governance Professionals Workshop and Strategy Session hosted by the Ak-Chin Indian Community in Maricopa, Arizona on September 9-11. The Professionals Workshop started with tribes sharing their experiences that helped successfully navigate the DOI/IHS negotiations process. The group then went into negotiation strategies with presentations from the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service who lectured on defining the zone of possible agreement (ZOPA), knowing your alternatives, use of standards, seeking underlying interest, developing options, protecting your representative and choosing your actions. The strategy session discussions included success and strategies in expanding Self Governance to non-BIA Agencies and improving efficiencies.

b. Tribal Self-Governance Advisory Committee (TSGAC)(IHS) / Self-Governance Advisory Committee (SGAC)(DOI)

The week of September 30 thru October 3, the Self Governance Director attended the TSGAC and SGAC meetings in Washington, D.C. IHS advised that a majority of the Title I and Title V funding agreements that are on a fiscal year basis are going to receive full lump sum funding for FY 2020 on October 1 even though there is a Continuing Resolution. IHS received special appropriation authority from OMB. It seems this should be an option for BIA as well; however, special appropriation was not requested by DOI, therefore, DOI funds will be distributed based on the continuing resolution. The issue of using inflation dollars to pay 105(l) leases that should be allocated to our programs and the need to request special appropriation funding to cover the 105(l) lease proposals similar to Contract Support Cost special appropriation was a main topic of discussion. The possibility of establishing a Tribal-Federal Workgroup to create performance measures, establish benchmarks for care coordination, and expand the reimbursement agreement to include Purchase and Referred Care payments when renewing the IHS-VA Reimbursement Agreement was an issue of discussion. IHS was also asked not to use the Director's Emergency Fund for internal budget shortfalls. Only three request for Emergency Funds were made in FY 2019 (1 from Alaska and 2 from the lower 48). Cherokee Nation was one of those asking from the lower 48.

Tara Sweeny, Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs attended the meeting and gave a brief overview of her one year accomplishments. Topics discussed during the DOI session included BIA's efforts get removed from GAOs High-Risk list; the timeliness of funding distributions to Tribes pursuant to Funding Agreements; the need for Tribes, Indian Affairs and Office of

Self-Governance to coordinate and collaborate to ensure Tribes desiring to enter into non-BIA Agreements are successful in assuming management of non-BIA functions and services.

The group discussed the Bureau of Indian Education being established as an independent Bureau with a separate funding source and the development of its own Greenbook. The group also raised concerns about ensuring the JOM language is crafted carefully to be inclusive of all the different situations that exist and the need for additional JOM funding due to the projected increase in the count. Another question was raised as to how the Department of Education and BIE are collaborating to ensure 90% of students in public schools are receiving high quality education and that AI/AN curriculum is being woven into the public school curriculum. The group discussed a need to develop a policy that holds states accountable for ensuring that Impact Aid Funds are used for AI/AN students. A request for a detailed breakdown by state of the funding amounts and formula being applied for the distribution of Impact Aid.

There was continued concern about the final 477 MOA, particularly related to the eligibility criteria and giving agencies outside of BIA authority to determine program eligibility. The group ask for an update on the Plan to address Tribal concerns with the 477 MOA. The Office of Indian Services will keep the group informed on the progress of plan development.
