A classroom has been set up for virtual school if necessary. *Tahlequah Child Development Center had some children transition to public schools. *Subsidy had 183 Parent Applications, 2648 contact with clients, providers, and other agencies by email, phone, or office. *Resource & Referral is not conducting on-site visits at this time. Virtual Technical Assistant has been provided this month and staff is working on Virtual Visits. Staff participated in on-line meetings, webinars, and trainings.





Programs With Court Interaction:



OCAPS: Out-Of-District Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

Involved in child welfare cases in non-jurisdiction counties in Oklahoma and all 50 states. Most work is done telephonically or electronically.

Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring States comply with it.

SCAPS: State Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

Involved in child welfare cases inside the 14 counties of which all or part are within the jurisdiction of the Nation.

Emphasis on education about the Indian Child Welfare Act and ensuring OKDHS compliance, and sometimes provide Tribal Foster Homes.

Provides services to the families when OKDHS fails to do so or as an alternative to OK DHS services.

TCAPS: Tribal Court Advocacy and Permanency Services

Involved in child welfare cases which are wholly under the jurisdiction of the Nation and OKDHS is not involved.

These cases originate on Indian Country or are transferred in from State district courts. Hearings are held at our Tribal Court House. Tribal Foster Homes are fully utilized.

GPA: Guardianships and Private Adoptions

Involved in civil adoption cases to include voluntary adoption, involuntary adoption and birth parent adoptions.

Monitors Guardianships and Private Adoptions for compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act and the best interests of children.

Serves Cherokee children and their families in Tribal Courts and State Courts throughout the United States.





Efficient & Effective Work

Eligibility Notices

When a County or State's child welfare agency gets involved in the life of a family that they suspect to be Cherokee, they're required by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to send Notice to the tribe. The tribe must then reply to confirm or deny whether the children are members of (or eligible to become members of) the tribe. Currently, with six case workers processing approximately 200-300 pieces of mail, per month, response times may vary due to vacancies and depending on amount of mail received. The tribe has a goal of responding between 45-60 days.

Cherokee Nation received:

- State of Oklahoma 412 notices involving 735 children.
- Outside of Oklahoma 556 notices for 925 children.
- Totaling 968 notices and 1,660 children.
- The average Response-to-Notice time

Prevention and Intervention

Indian Child Welfare Family Protection Services
Unit (FPS) assists families in need of hands-on
training to correct the conditions that lead to
children being removed from their home. These
services often include completing a 28 week
parenting program that discusses topics like
discipline, nutrition, budgeting, and housekeeping.
We primarily assist all our tribal CAPS cases but can
assist in State cases when a request is made. This
helps insure that families have the tools they need
to be reunited. We have also added Triple P
Parenting curriculum to our program this year.





Types of Certified Placement Resource Homes


- Non-Relative Adoptive: Families who hope to adopt children when the children's parents' rights
 are terminated. These homes do not take foster placements.
- Non-Relative Fost/Adopt: Families who take foster placement of children knowing their
 parental rights are not terminated and they could return home, but if they don't the placement
 family will have the first chance to adopt them.
- Non-Relative Foster: Families who are willing to take in children they do not know on a temporary basis, but may last years. These families usually do not adopt children.
- Relative Adoptive/Foster: Families who are related to the children and are fostering them or planning to adopt them. They do not take in children they are not related to.
- Emergency/Respite: Families that take very short-term placement of children while more permanent placements are sought or when only a short-term placement is needed.

Child Support:

The Office of Child Support services reports the following: The office has remained open to visitors since June 1, 2020 with a reduced work force (approximately 1/3 of staff) and a staggered work schedule that will continue through September 2020. A majority of the staff have been able complete some of their job duties while at home. Even through the Pandemic, the program has cotninued to see an increase of new applications. There is substantial increase already compared to FY 2019 so look forward to reporting that at end of this fiscal year 2020. The Child Support Staff continue to be a dedicated and committed group who oftentimes have had to wear more than one hat these past few months to ensure services are completed for the betterment of the CN citizens. The program continues to ensure certain precautions are routinely in place to assist with the health and safety of our staff and visitors to our offices.



ONE FIRE - Our Nation Ending Fear, Intimidation, Rape, and Endangerment.

Cherokee Nation ONE FIRE is a victim services unit now under Human Services. It has been in place since 2013 and has served over 700 victims in just the last three years.

Funded through Federal Grants, ONE FIRE offers a variety of support services for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking that including, rental assistance, utility assistance, emergency food, referrals for housing and emergency shelter, legal referrals and advocacy assistance. To adults who are victims of other crimes, ONE FIRE offers court advocacy and referrals for all previously listed services. The program does not discriminate and offers assistance to those who qualify (victims of crime) and reside within the tribe's 14 county jurisdiction.

August 2020 Monthly Report

Youth Development Activities:

Due to COVID 19 precautions, all Youth Development Activities were canceled for the month of August 2020.

Adult Resident Activities:

Due to COVID 19 precautions, all Adult Resident Activities were canceled for the month of August 2020.

Some sites do not have enough room to space out participants 6 ft. apart, scissors, glue, markers and other supplies and equipment have to be shared by participants and staff, a lot of our activities are very hands on and several of our participants have to have one on one instruction and help, a lot of our participants at our adult sites have a hard time hearing us anyway and wearing a mask would make it even more difficult for them to hear and most of our projects can't be done with gloves on, therefore we feel it would be in the best interest of our participants for their health and safety to cancel activities for August.

Staff working from home looked for new projects, documented new and current projects with materials & equipment lists, step by step instructions with pictures where needed, patterns and group preparation instructions, made sample projects, viewed webinars to help them when working with youth and the aging and when planning activities for them, viewed how to videos to learn new skills and expand their current skills, researched materials for drug free presentations, worked up drug free presentations and put together activity booklets and games to help reinforce learning from presentations about being drug free.

Staff working in the office on staggered schedule made post cards and sent to participants letting them know we miss them, are thinking of them and are looking forward to being able to conduct activities with them again soon. We are hoping this will help our elder and youth participants feel less isolated and let them know they aren't forgotten. Made and sent out 192 post cards to youth and adult participants. They are also working on organizing supplies and looking for working on new projects.

During the time of our canceled activities in September we have 4 staff who will be working the alternating schedule and will be cleaning and disinfecting our office & conference room areas, inventorying and organizing our supplies, working on new ideas for projects, documenting projects with materials & equipment list, patterns, step by step instructions and pictures when needed and preparation sheets for group activities using the projects, learning new techniques and skills, planning for future activities and doing prep for them, looking up activities we can do with the Elder groups we work with that will be fun for them and help combat the effects of Alzheimer's & Dementia & working up plans for drug free presentations and activities for our youth activities. 1 will also be working on documenting projects with materials & equipment list, patterns, step by step instructions and pictures when needed and making preparation sheets for group activities using the projects, viewing webinars, learning new techniques and skills and working up new projects while working from home on days when I am not in the office and 3 will be on admin leave when not in the office as one doesn't have a computer to work on at home and is staying in Lost City where he doesn't get a good enough signal for his hot spot to work and 2 don't have enough phone signal for their hot spot to work at their homes in Moody and Briggs.

We have 2 staff who due to underlying conditions will be working from home looking up new projects for activities, documenting them and making samples of them, viewing webinars that will help them when working with youth and the aging, watching how to videos and learning new skills and expanding skills they now have, researching materials and working up drug free presentations, working on presentations about setting goals and being safe for youth and putting together activity booklets and games to reinforce learning from presentations and to help our elder clients combat the effects of aging, Alzheimer's and Dementia.

ADAIR COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Malloy Hollow 85% of the property owners have been contacted and acquisition meetings are being scheduled. Several parcels have been acquired.
- 2. Bell School South Bridge Notice to Proceed was Jan. 6, 2020. Project is 98% Complete. Waiting on Guardrail Retrofit.
- 3. Bell School South Road –A preconstruction meeting was held on the job site August 28th. Construction time began on September 9, 2020 and will end September 25, 2020. Contractor placing Asphalt.
- 4. Oak Ridge Road Design is 60% complete. Right of Way documentation has been checked and returned to the engineer. Preliminary utility coordination has been completed. Area that is falling in is being assessed by CED #2.

CHEROKEE COUNTY PROJECTS:

- 1. Northeast Fort Gibson- Construction of Phase I is 70% complete. The contractor is placing aggregate base and subgrade method B.
- 2. Hulbert Lost City Road -AT&T will be repairing some areas of their relocation. Partial reimbursement is being processed for the Cherokee County RWD #11 relocation. Remainder will be processed once adequate vegetation has been attained.
- 3. Mud Valley Road Right-of-way staking has been completed. Appraisal site inspections have begun. GUY Engineering is in the process of reviewing preliminary utility placement and easements.

CRAIG COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. NS4340 also known as White Oak road – Project is 10% complete and the contractor is clearing and grubbing placing fill material and fencing. GUY Engineering is working with Craig RWD #2 to resolve the waterline placement and interference.

MAYES COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Chimney Rock Hollow –A mandatory prebid conference was held on September 15th.Twelve contractor/sub-contractors were present at the meeting.

SEQUOYAH COUNTY PROJECTS:

1. Dwight Mission Road – This is a cooperative project between Cherokee Nation, Sequoyah County, and ODOT. The project is 25% complete. Robinson Construction,

the dirt work contractor, has the majority of the dirt work completed. The drainage contractor has most of the cross drains extended, most of the culverts installed and they started on the bridge Monday. Commissioner Carter expresses his gratitude for the Cherokee Nation's help in improving his community.




















Department of Transportation Project Spotlight

DURING CONSTRUCTION



BELL SCHOOL SOUTH BRIDGE

A large amount of progress has taken place on this project since beginning January 6, 2020.

Bridge NBI #13779 was rated by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation to be structurally deficient in August 2011. The bridge was replaced with 3 boxes, each measuring 20'x10'x48'. The wing walls have been poured in place and asphalt is under way. Due to inclement weather and COVID-19, the project is taking longer than originally anticipated.







iSave

iSave is a matched savings program wherein income eligible families save money over a period of time and the iSave program matches the families' savings to build financial assets. **76 families are actively saving in iSave** for home rehabilitation. **70 families have received matching funds** to make home repairs or improvements.

Matching funds can be used for anything that increases the value of the primary residence, for example, a storm shelter, flooring, fencing, sidewalks, major appliance replacement, roofing, plumbing, etc.



336 families are in the home buyers' pipeline, either having completed or active in financial counseling.

Since FY07, 978 families unable to obtain a non-predatory mortgage on their own have completed self-sufficiency counseling and obtained a non-predatory mortgage.

37 families this year have finished counseling to obtain a non-predatory mortgage.

790 families have participated in financial and credit coaching this year; 279 of them are still actively pursuing their goals.

1,532 consumer loans totaling \$1,771,758.79 have been made through the Small Business Assistance Center as of September 15th. Self Sufficiency staff members have helped **5 families facing foreclosure**.

Families using MAP to purchase a home must attend an intensive **homeownership training** class. Year to date **129 families have attended these classes**, which are held throughout the Cherokee Nation.

Financial education classes are offered at no cost. Employees and the public have the opportunity to attend financial education classes on topics ranging from creating spending plans to balancing checkbooks. The more you know:

The CDC has issued a **federal eviction moratorium that took effect September 4, 2020 and lasts through December 31, 2020**. While this moratorium will provide much needed relief to families struggling to pay their rent, it's important to know that at this point, this moratorium only postpones evictions, there is no rent forgiveness involved. **When the moratorium expires December 31, 2020 all back rent will be due**. Additionally, the moratorium only applies to evictions related to non-payment; renters may still be evicted for breaking other terms of their lease agreement.

Renters facing eviction for non-payment should immediately provide a signed declaration to their landlord.
