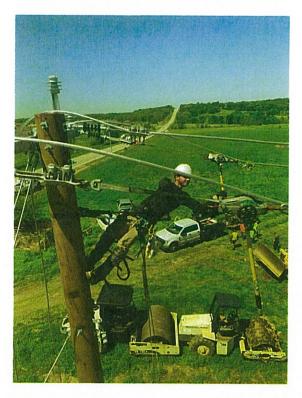

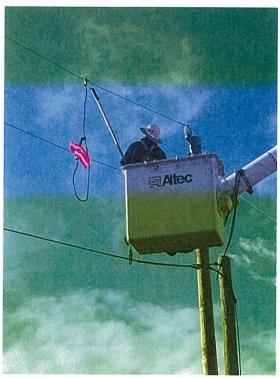

Vocational Training Success Story Jason Allen, High Voltage Lineman-OSUIT

Jason Allen enrolled in OSU -IT's High Voltage Lineman Program in the Fall 2018 after just graduating from high school in the Spring of 2018. 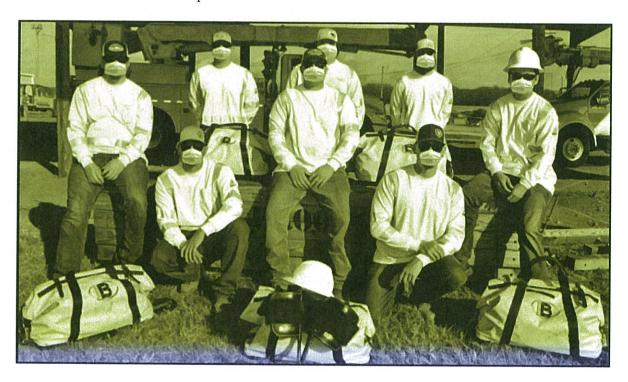

Fiber Technician Training Program

This short course is designed to train individuals in the Fiber Technician trade. Covered topics will include: Pole climbing; including learning to climb in the power zone, jigging or pulling fiber from start to finish, introduction to fiber splicing; both residential and commercial, learning to splice, hanging strand and fiber and lashing them together, hanging self-support and sagging to proper tension and advanced fiber splicing & troubleshooting. Training will also include OSHA 10, CPR and Class A CDL Permit.

Head Start

Accomplishments:

- 1) Received great feedback from families on the At Home Learning Activities. Each child on distance learning status, in Head Start and Early Head Start, received two boxes of toys that complement the teaching guide.
- 2) One of the ECU Administrative staff who is a fluent speaker was interviewed for a CNN article. So proud of Sandra Turner for passionately promoting her first language to ECU children and staff for the last 37 years in training and classroom activities.
- 3) The food distribution is ongoing and well received as well. Our families pick up meals on a weekly basis. The meals are nutritious and meet the CACFP guidelines. At least the children can still enjoy and benefit of one of their favorite parts of the program, the meal service.

New Initiatives:

- 1) The ECU is waiting patiently to reassume the space currently occupied by the Ga-Du-Gi clinic. A design plan is being developed to convert the space into office space and training room.
- 2) Plans are underway for the BiNax Now testing to be implemented in the ECU. Tentative Implementation date is mid February.
- 3) The ECU will begin the annual Community Assessment (CA) process/update. This tool is used to ascertain future enrollment; identify and access to necessary internal and external resources available for education, health, social service, facility needs and/or repair. The Self Assessment will begin soon. This is an internal tool for staff and partners to respond to the current status of all areas.

JOM is dedicated to supporting schools in their service to Native students. JOM staff have reimagined its policies, procedures, and programming, to give schools the opportunity to optimize their funding to meet the

ongoing and new needs students are experiencing. We will continue to assess the situation and work to implement appropriate changes for the greatest benefit to the student.

Sequoyah High School

Daily COVID-19 testing of students/staff members is going great. Sequoyah High School staff members are conducting the testing daily, Monday-Thursday in the Old Gym. We have tested over 2,555 people, with 18 positive cases. Great job to our students and staff on wearing their mask, adhering to social distancing practices, and keeping their hands clean!

The second term of classes began on Thursday, January 7, 2021. Teachers reported for Professional Development on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 5-6, 2021 to transition online classes to the new version of Blackboard- our Learning Management System that delivers classroom content to our students. We are still utilizing a block scheduling module and students have 4 classes each semester, and complete 2 semesters in each Fall and Spring term. Students can obtain 8 credits each school year. In a traditional school 7 period day, students are only able to obtain 7 credits in a school year.

The Oklahoma Department of Education and the BIE have not waived testing requirements for the 2020-2021 school year. These tests will take place in the Spring of 2021. We are currently awaiting confirmation from the USDE and BIE in regards to our request to utilize the ACT as the yearly assessment tool at Sequoyah High School. This has been approved by the BOE and Principal Chief, Chuck Hoskin, Jr.

The Oklahoma Department of Education did waive the TLE teacher observation and assessment for the 2020-2021 school year, as well as the need for 2021 Senior students to take CPR before graduating. We are awaiting Board of Education approval in February 2021 for this to be official.

The BIE issued an additional \$53,000 in instructional funds to schools. Our Leadership Team indicated that STEAM, STEM, Robotics, video streaming for extra-curricular events and an additional wrestling mat would be

beneficial to increase rigor academically and/or keep students and families safe during the pandemic and post-pandemic time.

Just before Christmas Sequoyah schools received a new bus. Now Sequoyah schools can proudly state we have acquired an all-electric school bus. This all electric school bus is the FIRST of its kind in the state of Oklahoma. The bus was purchased with a grant and had a cost of approximately \$350,000.00. The general managers from the bus manufacturers and several technicians came from in state and out to train the transportation team. This bus requires a very unique training on its care and operation. The bus operates solely on high voltage electricity. With this bus we have taken a giant step into the future of transporting students at Sequoyah schools. We are very proud to be the first school to promote cleaner air with a zero emissions bus.

Students, faculty and staff are working harder than ever to help each other reach their goals. Our technology issues are getting better every day. We are all working to shift our mindset to a positive one during these trying times.
